Are you a competitive person?

Recently I read an article written by a psychiatrist in which he said that all human beings are, by nature, competitive. Some are aware of it, some are not; but we all have some issue (or issues) around which we compete with everyone around us. Traditionally, it's sports or games. But really, people can be competitive about just about anything: popularity, wealth, knowledge, power, talent, attention, beauty, success...

This author noted that, basically, this competitiveness is a good thing – it pushes us try harder, to do better. The only problem, he noted, is that we tend to be competitive around things that don't really matter. Much of what we strive after ends up really just being a waste of time. Our efforts could have been better spent in other ways.

In his letter to the Church in Rome, the Apostle Paul

speaks to this issue. He addresses the competitive spirit in us all and he offers his fellow Christians some advice. "Outdo one another in showing honor," he writes. In other words, if you want to be the best at something, to be better than everyone else, try being the person who cares most about other people, particularly a person who goes out of their way to make others feel sincerely valued and worthwhile and good. Most especially remembering not only the people you already know, but the new people that come your way – "extend hospitality to strangers."

It's January. There are probably a number of very good reasons for this: Either people were somehow moved during the preceding holiday season and now want to form a closer relationship with the Lord; or, as many people do, they looked at the problems in their lives and have made a New Year's resolution to change – in this case, to devote themselves more to issues of faith.

Either way, they show up at our church. The problem is: Where are we?

At MUMC, do you know what month of the year is historically one of the lowest in average worship attendance?

You got it: It's January. Following Christmas, the weekly worship attendance of current members drops off dramatically. And when we do come, it seems like we drag ourselves in here as if we're walking our last mile. I know I've been guilty of this. There are a number of very good reasons for it: We're tired after doing the work of preparing and presenting the holiday programs and get together, it's been so hectic we all want a little break; there's the inevitable letdown after all the hype; and the ever present "winter blahs" – just not enough sunshine! It's all very understandable.

The only problem is: Timing. People show up looking for a church just when most of the church isn't there.

Think about it: If you had just moved to a new town, or had just gone through a crisis in your life, and you were seeking to draw closer to God and you went to a church seeking the Lord, which church would most appeal to you: A full, vibrant church filled with happy, welcoming people who make you feel good about yourself? Or a half empty church, with a few exhausted people keeping to themselves as much as possible?

In the vows of membership that all United Methodists take, we pledge to support the ministry of the local church "by our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness..." Think about that second one: Our presence. Did you ever stop to think that just by showing up to

church on Sunday you could help someone else on to the Lord? Your presence in church each week may mean all the difference whether or not some lost, hurting individual finds Jesus Christ that day – or ever!

This New Year, let's get competitive. Let us make a New Year's Resolution that really matters. Let us resolve to outdo one another in showing honor, particularly to the visitor in our midst. Let us resolve to be present; to be joyful; to be welcoming; to make every person we meet feel good about themselves; and to greet, each Sunday, at least one person we do not currently know.

Company's coming. Let's get ready. Theologically, and practically, Christmas isn't an ending, it's a beginning!

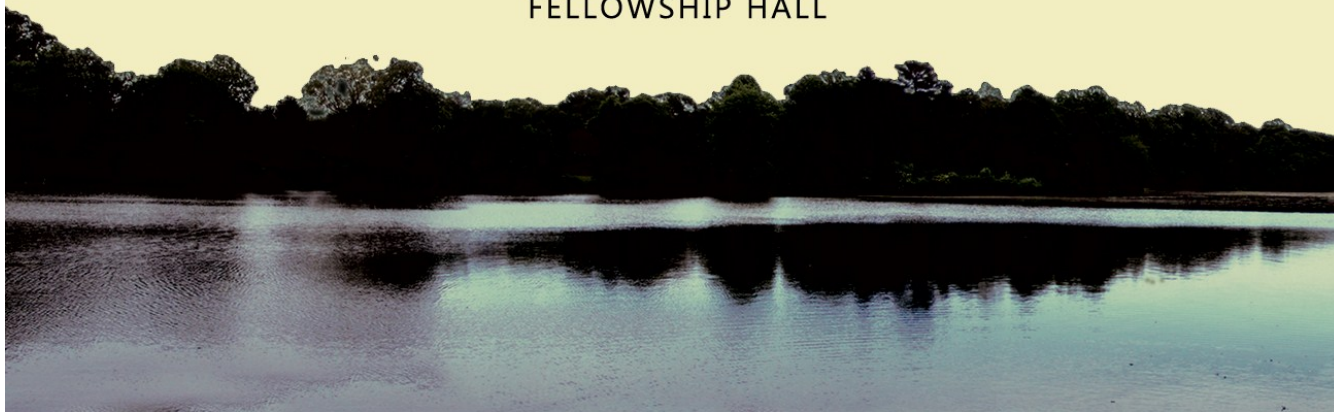

Why Should I Remember Manahawkin UMC In My "Will"?

In this article, I'd like to discuss remembering the church in your "Will". Frankly, this isn't the most stimulating topic in the world, and, it's a subject that many people would rather avoid. But, please remember that to an atheist no explanation of death is possible, while to us Christians, none is necessary.

But first, let's look at a few key reasons why such giving is vital both to you as well as to our church. As church members our vows ask us to support our church with our prayers, our presence, our services, our gifts, and our witness. Each of these items plays an essential part in our personal church growth. In addition, the Bible reminds us that "The Lord loves a cheerful giver".

I hope I can bring the point home by using examples from our own church history and, thus, make this discussion a lot more interesting.

To show the impact of such giving, let's look at the benefits derived from the gifts left by Marjorie Penn and Ruth Ramella. Both were long time members of this church and knew its needs well. The use of their gifts enabled your church to:

- Hire the Goold's, as our Youth Group Cordina-tors, to help reach more local youth, etc.
- Hire Kirsten Mosher, as our Outreach Coordina-tor, to help set up a church website, provide weekly emails, and coordinate various func-tions. She also helps set up newspaper inter-views that provide local coverage.

Both the Goold's and Kirsten Mosher are very tal-ented people. They are a great addition to our church staff.

- Marjorie Penn's and Ruth Ramella's gifts also financed the new church elevator and helped remodel our Church Kitchen as well as finance various other projects.

Each of the above four items has been completed. However, our work is NOT done. In the next phase of our church's growth, we will:

Why Sunday School?

This question can be heard in many households across America on Sunday mornings. My own children often balk at the idea of having to get up, get dressed and get out the door on Sunday morning. Why Sunday School indeed.

Sunday School offers the educational component of church. Children learn the bible basics and stories. However, Sunday School is only one part of a child's spiritual journey. Alone it can be informative and fun, but it's kind of like having a burger without the fries...tasty but not fully satisfying.

So when Sunday School is all you have, it can seem kind of 'boring and a bit like school' (actual quote from student). Now, if you add worship (fries), youth group (milkshake), community outreach (cheese) and music programs (tasty pie) the experience takes on an entirely new dimension and flavor.

Our children are bombarded daily with messages challenging their faith and pulling

them from their journey. Whether it be on TV, magazines or on the web our children are experiencing 'in your face' messages against biblical teachings.

Spoiler Alert: As much as I despise references to 'when I was young', I feel called to use one here. When I was young it was easy to turn off the messages from marketers, it was easy to find some alone time and enjoy it. Today our children are plugged in 24/7. There are few places to hide and even fewer places to not feel the pressure of a society wanting you to act and look a certain way.

One of the best features of our Sunday School program is that you are welcomed as you are. We 'like' you because we are building a relationship with you (shameless Facebook slam from a self-admitted FB junky).

Sunday School can be the beginning of a life-long relationship with God. A relationship that will carry our children through good and bad times, one that they can count on. But like any relationship they will need to put some effort into it.

I challenge all of us parents to add some 'more flavor' to our own & our children's faith journey. Add some fries, a milkshake, cheese (if not lactose intolerant) and don't forget the dessert!

So the question really should be 'Why not Sunday School?'

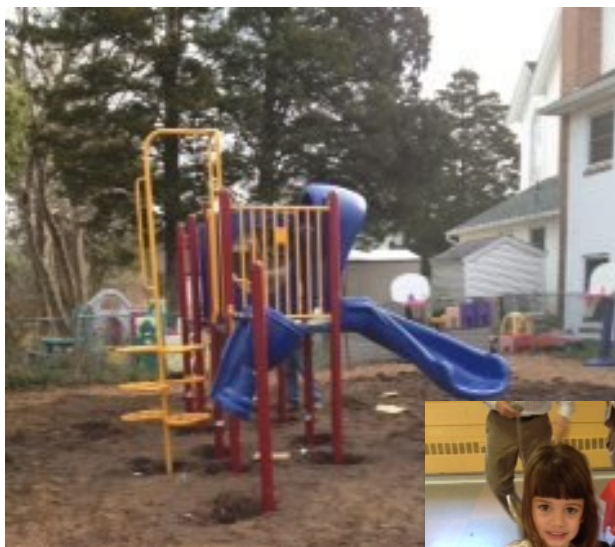

Making Grape Vine Wreaths

Blair and I grow grapes in our yard. Well, I should say they grow in our yard despite us. The soil is good and the sun is strong and of the three original vines we planted, one took. For the past five years, Blair has tended to our sprawling grapevine that grows up and over our deck providing beauty, shade and upon occasion, grapes. We discovered that at the end of each season the vine needs to be pruned way back to three main stalks in order to flourish the following summer.

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful"

John 15 : 1-2

At the end of this season we cut back all the vines, pulled off the leaves and wrestled them into the back of the truck to bring with us to youth group. It was our intention to work these wryly vines into wreaths. When the kids came in that night the floor of the fellowship hall was a mass of tangled vines. "What are all these sticks doing here?" was the question asked. We explained that they were not sticks at all but grapevines and that it would be the task of each one of us to wind these vines into a circle; a wreath. This was no easy endeavor. The vines needed to be coaxed, worked and shaped into the desired circle. We did not use fasteners but rather wound the vines into themselves, braiding them and bending them into submis-

sion. The kids worked hard and with persistence each one crafted a wreath out of the original mess of "sticks". They asked for help, they encouraged each other, and they worked together, even making one giant wreath that currently hangs in the fellowship hall over the mural.

"I am the vine and you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." John 15 5

In the end, the wreaths were decorated with pine cones, eucalyptus, berries and cinnamon sticks. Then each member proudly presented their gift to their families. The grapevines came full circle, each season of its life serving a purpose according to God's design. The youth group is continually growing and learning the benefit of the occasional "pruning" that helps us be all He desires us to be. Beautiful!



- Sell some land on Beach Avenue, and use the proceeds to help build a new church parking lot in the rear of the church.

Having some trust funds available to meet ongoing and emergency needs of the church are also highly beneficial (i.e. re-roof the Church and Fellowship Hall; replace the boiler that heats Fellowship Hall), to name a few.

Please remember, you may specify the use of your legacy, if that is your desire. However, unrestricted gifts do give your church more flexibility. Nevertheless, the choice is yours. Needless to say, if every member "Tithed" in their will, the church's future growth would be greatly enhanced. All gifts, regardless of size or form are greatly appreciated. Please remember that the Bible reminds us that "to whom much is given, much is expected". Such future gifts will enable supporting more outreach programs that will, in turn, bring more souls to Jesus Christ. In conclusion, I hope that by using the examples given earlier, I have personalized this issue for you. After prayerful consideration, please consider helping your church by remembering it in your "Will".

Federal regulations require that donors wait 56 days between regular whole blood donations. **Please remember to bring proper identification to the blood drive.**

Consider being a Double Red Cell Donor if you are type O or B.

To be eligible you must be:

- Male - at least 130 pounds and 5'1" tall
- Female - at least 150 pounds and 5'5" tall
