PASTOR'S COLUMN

"Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teach them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:16-20

The final words of the risen Christ to his disciples: Commissioning them to go forth and make disciples.

Who helped you to come to faith in Jesus Christ?

In his book, What About Tomorrow?, author J. Wallace Simpson tells the true story of a Baptist minister, Dr. Gordon Torgerson, sailing across the Atlantic one summer. Torgerson noticed a man sitting in a deck chair reading the Bible. He sat down beside him and said, "Forgive my curiosity, but I'm a Baptist minister. I assume you are a Christian, and I'm interested to know how it happened."

"Yes," said the man, setting aside his Bible. "I'm very glad to talk about that. I'm a Filipino. I was born in a good Catholic home in the Philippines. Some years ago, I came to the United States to study law. My first night on campus, a student came to see me. He said, 'I've come to welcome you to the campus and to say that if there is anything I can do to help make your stay here more pleasant, I hope you'll call on Then he asked me where I went to church and I told him I was raised Catholic. He said, 'Well, I can tell you where the Catholic church is, but it's not easy to find. It's quite a distance away. Let me make a map.' So he made an outline of the way to the church and left.

"When I awakened Sunday morning, it was raining. I thought to myself, I'll just not go to church today. I'll get some more sleep."

"Then there was a knock on the door and when I opened it there stood that student. His raincoat was dripping wet and on one arm he had two umbrellas, and he said, 'I thought you might have a hard time finding your church in the rain. I shall walk along with you and show you the way.'

"As we walked along in the rain under the two umbrellas I asked, 'Where do you go to church?'
"'Oh,' he said, 'my church is just around the corner.'

"I said, 'Suppose we go to your church today and we'll go to my church next Sunday.'

"I went to his church and I've never been back to my own. After four years, I felt it was not the law for me, but the ministry. I went to Drew Seminary in New Jersey and was ordained a Methodist minister, and received an appointment to a Methodist church in the Philippines. My name is Valencius. I am Bishop Valencius, Bishop of the Methodist Church in the Philippines."

This is a fascinating story of one of the most important people in the world - not the bishop, though he is important - but the man with the two umbrellas. In back of every convert to the Christian faith, in back of every church that was built, in back of every Christian enterprise and movement in history, you will find someone like that unnamed fellow with two umbrellas. An or-

dinary man or woman, a person who believed that the salvaging of souls was important, a person who dared to make his faith so useful, a person who dared to make her faith so attractive, that other people said, "I want the kind of faith you have!" We can turn the world upside down when we dare to live out our faith because we believe that each person is precious to God.

Will you dare to do that?

Will you dare to be the person with two umbrellas?

In this season of Easter, let us take up our Savior's commission, and each resolve to help someone else find new life in Jesus Christ!

Ushering

Duties of the Usher

The ministry to which a person is called when he or she becomes a church usher can best be described in the following ways:

- Greet worshippers, making every attempt to help them feel welcome and at ease.
- Escort members and guests to their seats.
- Distribute materials related to the service/ meeting such as bulletins, hymnals, handouts, etc.

For May we will be collecting canned meals (Chief Boyardee meals, stew & soups).

Another way The Mission Committee is combating hunger is our church garden. The garden has been expanded and the planting has started. In May we are going to start meeting twice a week to weed and tend the garden, check the Mission bulletin board (located in the main hallway) for dates and times.

To help combat homelessness we are working with the organization Family Promise which helps homeless families transition back to permanent housing. We are looking for volunteers to cooks meals and or spend time socializing with the families. Becoming a Member at MUMC

The number one question asked about church membership is "Why should I join the church?" Our answer is simple, we believe that the 'body' of Christ works best when we are united together (I CORINTHIANS 12). Therefore, it is important for us to make a commitment to Christ and live it out in the Church.

The process for becoming a member is threefold:


- 1. Make a decision to follow Christ
- 2. Attend our Methodist 101 class that is held on the 4th Sunday of each month at 10AM in the large classroom. This class offers the new member an understanding of The United Methodist Church's origins and theology.
- 3. Stand for membership before the congregation during a membership service.

There are different types of membership:

• **Profession of Faith:** This is done when the individual has no prior church membership.

- This is a "new" Christian and is baptized if he/she has not already been baptized.
- Reaffirmation of Faith: This is done when the individual has been away from membership in the church for a long time or simply doesn't know where the church membership is.
- Transfer from Another Denomination:
 This is done when a person is a member of another denomination. We write that church and let them know of the individual's desire to unite with Central.
- Transfer from Another United Methodist Church: This is done when a person is a member of another United Church. We write that church and let them know the individual's desire to unite with MUMC.

The second question we hear a lot: "Can I be involved in the church even if I don't want to join?" ABSOLUTELY! We welcome everyone to all our events, worship and service opportunities..

What is Relay?

Relay is an overnight relay-style even where teams of people camp out around a track. Members of each team take turns walking around the track for the duration of the event. Food, games and activities provide entertainment and fundraising opportunities. This is a family-friendly environment for the entire community.



Survivors Lap

Relay starts with a Survivors Lap – an inspirational time when survivors are invited to circle the track together and help everyone celebrate the victories we've achieved over cancer. We also recognize and celebrate caregivers at Relay For Life. These individuals give their time, love, and support to friends, family, neighbors, and coworkers who face cancer.

Luminaria Ceremony

After dark, we honor people who have been touched by cancer and remember loved ones lost to the disease during the Luminaria Ceremony. Candles are lit inside bags filled with sand, each one bearing the name of a person touched by cancer, and participants often walk a lap in silence.





Fight Back Ceremony

Last, there is a Fight Back Ceremony, where we make a personal commitment to save lives by taking up the fight against cancer. That personal commitment may be to do something as simple as getting a screening test, quitting smoking, or talking to elected officials about cancer. By taking action, people are personally taking steps to save lives and fight back against a disease that takes too much.
