Pastor's Column

Monday, September 3, 2012: Labor Day. The end of the summer vacation season.

Labor Day is a strange holiday. While we call it "Labor Day," we try to do as little labor as possible and most working people have the day off. Nobody wishes one another a "Happy Labor Day," we didn't get any Labor Day cards, we don't decorate our houses, or give Labor Day gifts. It's the only holiday that florists and greeting card manufacturers have yet to figure out a way to capitalize on. And maybe that should tell us something. Something strange is going on here. Have you ever wondered how this holiday came about? The story is an interesting one –and it goes like this:

Most of the world observes May 1st as Labor Day – a day to honor labor - but not us. The September date was chosen way back when because it was halfway between the 4th of July and Thanksgiving. September 5, 1882 saw the first American labor day parade. It was held in New York City with 20,000 participants carrying banners calling for 8 hours for work, 8 hours for rest, and 8 hours for recreation. It was a day of protest calling for worker's rights, a challenge to the unbridled greed of the wealthy, and

a fundamental alteration of society in response to human rights violations.

Well, this was a one-shot deal that didn't catch on. Instead the story shifted from New York to Illinois...

In 1880, George Pullman, whose company made sleeping cars for the railroads, designed and built a town near Chicago - Pullman, Illinois - to provide a community for his workers that would be protected from the seductions of the big city. The town was strictly organized: row houses for the assembly and craft workers; modest Victorians for the managers; and a luxurious hotel where Pullman himself lived and where visiting customers, suppliers, and salesman would stay while they were in town. The residents all worked for the Pullman company, their paychecks drawn from Pullman bank, with their rent, set by Pullman, deducted automatically from their weekly wages. The town, and the company, operated smoothly and successfully for more than a decade.

But in 1893, the Pullman Company was caught in the economic depression that gripped the entire nation. Orders for railroad sleeping cars declined, and George Pullman was forced to lay off hundreds of employees. Those who remained had to take pay cuts, even while their rents in Pullman-owned homes stayed at previous rates. So the employees walked out, demanding lower rents and higher wages.

The American Railway Union came to the cause of the strikers, and railroad workers across the nation

boycotted trains carrying Pullman cars. Rioting, looting, and burning of railroad cars soon ensued; mobs of non-union workers joined in. The strike instantly became a national issue. President Grover Cleveland, faced with nervous railroad executives and interrupted mail trains, declared the work stoppage a federal crime and deployed 12,000 troops to break the strike. Violence erupted, and two men were killed when US deputy marshals fired on protesters near Chicago. Finally, on August 3, 1894, the strike was declared over. The union was disbanded, and Pullman employees signed a pledge that they would never again unionize.

As you can imagine, labor was not happy. Protests against President Cleveland's harsh methods made the appeasement of the nation's workers a top political priority; after all, 1894 was an election year! In the immediate wake of the strike, legislation was rushed through both houses of Congress, and the bill arrived on President Cleveland's desk just six days after his troops had broken the Pullman strike. The President seized the chance for conciliation, and Labor Day was born. Curiously, the ploy didn't work - he wasn't reelected. And in a final irony, ever since then, Labor Day has been seen as the unofficial start of the campaign season.

And, in all of this, notice what finally plays out here:

Labor Day was originally intended as a day to honor labor and to stand up for change against wrongs in the world. And yes, by taking a day of rest, Labor Day is a time to recognize the hard work so many people put in to enable us all to live the blessed lives we live. However, the September date should always remind us of just how difficult it is to truly change the world for the better. And, even more, how easily we are kept from doing so – how easily we are appeased: selling out real societal change in favor of an afternoon off and a backyard barbeque.

Jesus said: "What will it profit (a person) if they gain the whole world but forfeit their soul?" (Mark 8:36)

The Apostle Paul said: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2) As Christians, we are in the transforming, not the conforming, business. To be seeking not just what "gets along" with what is; but what works the perfect will of God – that might be.

This Labor Day, as we take a day off, might we each also take time in prayer to ask what causes, as the Body of Christ in the world, we are being called to take up. Not just what labor we can avoid; but what mighty labor we are called to do!

Fall officially arrives September 22, but it is not too early to prepare for flu season. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reports that more than 200,000 people are hospitalized from complications of the flu each year. An annual flu shot reduces your risk of getting the flu. It takes about two weeks after the shot for antibodies to develop in the body to protect against the flu. A yearly shot is needed as the body's immunity declines and each year the shot protects against the more prevalent flu strains. Flu shots are usually available starting in September. We look forward to this coming winter as we will have our first winter program over the holiday break.


This two day program will start on Dec. 30th and end with the New Year's

The Manahawkin Methodist Preschool will open its doors for the first day of the 2012-2013 school year on Monday September 10th. We will start our year with full enrollment, a new world culture program for Pre K, new fitness class for all students and a new music room.

Our Beginners will start their year with a unit on families. Each student will bring in photos of their families to place on the classroom family tree. Mrs. Dahlberg and Mrs. Russo will use the photos to help the children adjust to their new class and work on language skills by

encouraging the children to talk about their families.

Our Three's will start the year off with a unit on Teddy Bears. All of Mrs. Kolbmann and Mrs. Jones's students will surely be happy to share their first school experiences with a familiar friend from home. They will work on math skills by creating patterns with Teddy Graham cookies and marshmallows and by reading Goldilocks and the 3 bears; they will learn the concept of small, medium and large.

The Pre- K program will start the year off with a unit about community and how their classroom is like a mini community. They will work together to create classroom rules and talk about similarities and differences they share.
