The search for Manahawkin United Methodist Church's new Pastor has already begun with the PPRC holding meetings to outline our pastoral needs. Fran Noll, our District Superintendent (DS) will be providing candidates to the PPRC starting on February 28, 2013. All pastoral search progress will be provided by PPRC to the congregation as it develops. The

new Pastor will be leading us starting on July 7, 2013.

We have had nine very active years of outstanding sermons and spiritual leadership under Pastor Clark and pray for a truly effective new Pastor to replace Clark. Please give Clark your well wishes over the next few months and enjoy his continued spiritual guidance. This is a significant move for Clark as the St. John's church is nearly twice the size of Manahawkin and one of the largest United Methodist Churches in New Jersey.

Many of you have already expressed your disappointment over Clark and Traci's upcoming departure. Clark has had several years longer with us than the average for a UMC Pastor in our Conference. He did not ask for a move but it does meet his family needs for a move if it had to come about in addition to providing a promotion.

Again, PPRC would like to wish Clark and his family the BEST in this new segment of their lives.

## How Does a Reappointment Happen?

You may be wondering who decides when a Pastor is reassigned. Pastoral appointments are an annual process taken on by our Conference.

In a letter to Clergy and Lay Disciples dated 2/11/13, Bishop Schol outlines the process:

"Gifts of God have been handed out above and below, ...gifts of apostle, prophet, evangelist, and pastor-teacher to train Christians in skilled servant work, working within Christ's body, the church, until we're all moving rhythmically and easily with each other, efficient and graceful in response to God's Son, fully mature adults, fully developed within and without, fully alive like Christ. –Ephesians 4:10-13 (The Message)

Dear GNJ Clergy and Lay Disciples of Jesus Christ,

God blessed the church with gifts for leading and serving congregations and world. GNJ is richly blessed with these gifts as evident in our vital ministries and congregations and we want to be faithful to our giftedness through the appointment process.

The cabinet held its appointment retreat at the end of January to assess present appointment needs and begin a season of prayer and discernment. During the retreat, we shared stories of how the Holy Spirit is moving in our congregations and our laity and clergy - a testimony to Ephesians 4!

The cabinet meets each year for an appointment retreat because as United Methodists, we covenant to appoint clergy through an itinerant system. Pastors are assigned to the various churches as our founder John Wesley and Bishop Frances Asbury initiated more than 200 years ago. Wesley said it is how we "spread scriptural holiness across the land."

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Preparation for the appointment season began in November. Superintendents assessed each congregation and pastor under their supervision. Each superintendent individually met with the bishop to discuss clergy, congregations, challenges and opportunities.

Our initial assessment indicates that we will have 25 open appointments. Thirteen due to retirements, two because pastors requested an extension ministry, four due to the growth of churches who now seek an associate pastor, one because a church has grown and is moving from part time to full time, and five because pastors chose an inactive status (leave of absence, medical leave, etc.).

As we make appointments, the GNJ Cabinet's mission is to maximize making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of congregations, communities and the world.

Through appointments, the cabinet seeks to fulfill the great commission, (*Go and make disciples*) and the great commandment (love God and love your neighbor as yourself) as we transform lives, communities and the world.

The cabinet will meet each week during the appointment season. We ask for your prayers each Sunday and throughout the week as we appoint pastors to our churches.

The United Methodist Church is an itinerant church and pastors commit to itinerate throughout the conference. We also have open itinerancy and we do not appoint pastors based on race or gender, but on gifts and graces.

In our prayerful discernment for appointing pastors we consider the experience, spirit and fruitfulness of our pastors <u>and</u> congregations:

<u>Experience</u> – are clergy and congregations using their gifts from God

<u>Spirit</u> – are clergy and congregations hopeful, courageous, and positive

<u>Fruitfulness</u> – are clergy and congregations growing, making new disciples, building up the body of Christ and using their gifts for ministry and mission (we look at the 10 year track record of a pastor and a congregation)

The denomination's recent *Call to Action* study indicated that our denomination needs *turn-around leaders*. Turn-around leaders are forward leaning leaders who lead congregations to become disciple making and disciple engaging. These leaders are leading their congregations to connect with the non and nominally religious, engage in transformative mission and ministry, mature disciples' faith and grow the congregation.

These leaders thrive in congregations that welcome new people, develop new forms of worship and ministry, and engage in life-changing mission.

We take this opportunity to thank our clergy for your ministry and your willingness to engage in the itinerant system. You have made significant sacrifices for the ministry of Jesus Christ.



#### **Musical Program of Recovery**

Our Worship Committee proudly presents "Musical Program of Recovery" on Sunday, March 17th at 4:00PM in the church Sanctuary.

The composer, Eric Houghton takes the listener on an emotional journey of recovering from alcohol addiction through music.

Houghton shares the following about his works: "A little over two and a half years ago, I was forced to make a choice: Should I live or should I die? I decided the former was a better way to go, and therefore spent a little over a week in nearby Carrier Clinic, rehabbing from chronic alcoholism. While there, I was able to grasp the once absurd notion that it might just be possible for me to survive without ever tak-

ing another drink. With the help of family, friends, God and a wonderful program of recovery, I am here to say that it is indeed possible. Quite more than that, it was the greatest and most rewarding decision I have ever made.

My days are now filled with possibilities. I wrote a memoir based on my experiences at Carrier and my life with alcohol, *Boozehound!* Breaking a 30-Year Obsession, and I have a signed contract from a publisher. My teaching is more rewarding than ever, as is my family-life. Every area of my life has improved dramatically since that fateful day in 2010 when I finally found some honesty.

This Musical Program of Recovery is yet another way—through music—of telling what it was like to be in the grip of this most cunning of diseases. Especially in Recovery and Five Anonymous Songs, I try to capture some of the emotions and experiences of both the active user and the newly sober. I hope you are able to appreciate and enjoy what I was somehow able to create and now share with you."

## HEALTHY BODY, MIND AND SPIRIT

When we think of vaccinations or "shots" we usually think of early childhood immunizations. Today there are "shots" recommended for adults:

- Flu shot is recommended annually for everyone over age 6 months
- One shingles shot is recommended for persons 60 years and above
- One pneumonia shot is recommended for anyone 65 and older
- One Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis) vaccination after age 19 in place of a Tetanus booster.
- Tetanus booster every 10 years
- Talk to your healthcare provider to learn what vaccines are recommended for you.
