#### **Pastors Corner**

## The plant in the garden of your heart (Mark 4:1-20)

Some years ago in Michigan, one day in June, my family planted four plants of zucchini in our garden. The following night, something totally unexpected and terrible happened. The temperature dropped down to 30 degrees (yes, anything is possible in Michigan), and it almost killed those plants. When I saw them the following morning, they seemed dead with all the leaves and stems drooping on the ground.

Discouraged, yet, not totally despairing, I watered them anyway, hoping that they would come back. The next day, I went out again to check on them, Io and behold, all the drooped stems were popped up, showing signs of liveliness again. I was not only delighted with the plants coming back to life, but I was also amazed at the power that made it all possible. It was the power within the plant that brought the almost dead plants back to normal again. I would call such power **life**.

Speaking of **life**, Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the **life**" (John 11: 25). He also said, "What I have spoken are spirit and **life**." (John 6:63). Since we became Christians, Jesus Christ is in us through His Spirit. In other words, Jesus the **life** dwells in us as the life-giving source in our lives.

If we can call our heart a garden, in every believer's heart, there is one plant growing— the 'plant of God's word' (first as seed, later grown into a plant). Imagine yourself taking a look at the very plant in the garden of your heart. How is your plant doing? Do you see some stems of your plant drooped? Do you see the stem of love poisoned by hate and resentment? Do you see the stem of hope killed by despair and frustrations? Do you see another stem choked by anxieties and lusts? Or, is the whole plant in your heart completely flat?

If you observe any of these unhealthy signs, don't you think it is time for the life-giving Spirit of God to be at work? What should you do? Give over the control to the life-giving Holy Spirit in you and let the Spirit be in charge. Simply listen and obey Him. You may need to forgive somebody. You may need to restore your trust in God. You may need to cast away anxieties and cares to the Lord, acknowledging that

they do no good. Then, and only then, will you see the plant of God's word come alive again, just like the zucchini plants. Amen.

## **Our Fiscal Fitness**

As you can see from the weekly bulletin, the generosity of the congregation has enabled us to pay all the bills with a little left over as donations are on target and expenses are below our plan.

A Future With Hope has the mission to restore homes damaged by Hurricane Sandy for the elderly, disabled, and impoverished, to provide treated nets to protect children from the mosquitoes that carry malaria, and to provide funds for local missions. This is a three year project of the NJ Conference that has a goal of raising \$12 million with \$7 million allocated to putting people back in their homes by rebuilding and repairing 300-500 homes, \$2 million allocated to eradicating malaria by 2015, and \$3 million allocated to revitalize local congregations through local missions. Manahawkin United Methodist has committed to contributing \$11,000 to A Future With Hope, \$3,000 of which is anticipated to come from the generous donations of the congregation. So far, we have already raised \$805 of the \$1,000 anticipated for 2014.

## REAL PROPERTY

Have you ever thought about real property? We all own and use real property every day. What is real property and why is it so important? Real property consists of lands and improvement to land, buildings, and facilities. It includes equipment affixed and build into the facility as an integral part of the facility (such as heating and air conditioning systems, elevators, chair lifts, and installed carpeting and flooring). To better understand real property and how it relates to the Manahawkin United Methodist Church let us substitute the word facility with the word church. Real property is so important that the Book of Discipline identifies it as the number one primary responsibility of the Board of Trustees. Paragraph 2532.1 states; "The board of Trustees shall have the supervision, oversight, and care of all real property owned by the church or any society, board, class, commissions, or similar organizations connected therewith."

So, the next time you come to church think about real property and take a look around. You walk into the church through the front doors; use the stairs, chair lift or elevator to reach the sanctuary; walk down the carpeted aisles, and take a seat in a pew mounted to the floor of the Church building. During the service you are kept comfortable by the installed heating and air conditioning system and participate in the worship service with the electricity provided for the lighting, sound system and organ. When the service is over you walk back down those carpeted aisles to the stairs, chair lift or elevator to go back down and out the front doors.

This is the first of two articles about the types of property we own at the church. The next article will focus on church equipment and church property. Take a minute sometime and make a list of what you think church equipment and church property might be. See how close you come to what I identify. You might even list some items I may have overlooked. Good luck. The Board of Trustees would like to thank all our members for their continued support to our church and the assistance you provide us with your time, talents, and service to spread the love of Christ. We couldn't do it without you.
