PASTOR'S CORNER The Year of Jubilee Mid-Report

Jesus *said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father but through Me" (John 14:6, NASB).

"and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free" (John 8:32, NASB).

Who will set us free? Jesus will, because He is the Truth!

If you remember, last January, as pastor of MUMC, I declared this year to be the Year of Jubilee. Let us not give up on our petitions until we are all free in all aspects of life.

I look forward to hearing more testimonies from God's people how Jesus has released them from bondage to freedom throughout the year! Let us offer our sacrifices of joy and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father in 2017 and beyond! Amen.

Watching a building being taken down is a remarkable sight. Rather than doing so by means of an explosion, instead, the building foundation is weakened by explosives allowing the structure to implode or to fall from within.

Many scholars and historians feel that ancient Rome fell from within. Although challenged by outside civilizations they feel that because of the immorality, the corruption and arrogance in its political system, perverted justice, paganism, oppression of the people including violation of their civil and human rights and greed, just to name a few, ultimately Rome destroyed itself.

When looking at our society today we have to ask ourselves, are we walking down that same road and for the same reasons; will we fall from within? Look around at what is happening in our society and government. Are we afraid to call sin for what it is because of the political and financial backlash? Why did our new Congress try, in closed session, to do away with the Ethics Board, which holds them responsible and accountable? How much more do we ignore doing for the least of these and without exception? Why do we allow bills being passed in closed session that may violate the civil rights of some individuals? Has greed, money and materialism become our god? Abraham Lincoln once wrote, "We have been preserved these many years, in peace and prosperity. We have grown in numbers, wealth and power, as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God!" James Madison warned, "There are more instances of the abridgement of freedom of the people by gradual and silent encroachment by those in power than by violent and sudden usurpations."

The Book of Proverbs gives us much insight into the problems we face and what to do about them, as do other Scriptures. How often do we read them? How often do we ask ourselves what can I do to help bring about change? Silence is not golden! Not only ancient Rome but also Nazi Germany are prime examples of what can happen.

It is written God allows something to happen --- sometimes in response to ungodliness. Allowing things to run their course in an effort to bring people to repentance. Has that time come?

SHOPRITE GIFT CARD PROGRAM

This is the program we have with Shop Rite. The Church purchases gift cards from Shop Rite at a 5% discount, then we resell them to

the congregation and friends at face value, so essentially, Shop Rite gives us 5% of everything purchased with these cards. Since starting this program in January of 2014, Shop Rite has given us \$4,185.00. Orders are taken on the first Sunday of each month, with cards being given to the purchasers and money collected on the second Sunday. You only pay for the cards when you receive them. Checks must be made payable to MUMC with Shop Rite in the memo. The cards come in denominations of \$100.00, \$50.00, and \$25.00. They can be used at any Shop Rite and never expire. We usually have extra cards if you forget to order them on the first Sunday and would like to help with this easy way of adding to our church income. Profit for March and April will be \$255.00 when all these cards are sold.

However, more participating members are encouraged to attend monthly meetings and to become involved in mission work and spiritual development. Each monthly session includes fellowship, program FAITH - HOPE - LOVE IN ACTION (issues), and business updates and plans.

In January, Emilie Spendiff and Dottie Silvestri presented a program on Fair Trade, which was based on one of the issues discussed in the book "Refuse to Do Nothing". As a result, letters were sent to Wendy's CEO and local manager to encourage this food chain to buy from farmers who are part of fair trade practices (fair wages and prices). Otherwise, we would join others who are boycotting Wendy's.

In February, Joyce Trainor and Eileen Mahan presented a program on Climate Justice, Part 1. They emphasized God's beautiful creation of the world and humankind's responsibility of caring for His creation as stewards of His gift.

It was with regret that the March meeting was cancelled because of extreme weather conditions. Pastor Choi was scheduled to present on inspirational Lenten message.

Lynn Dash was our guest speaker in April. She is active with several Monmouth County groups which advocate on behalf of climate/environmental /concerns. Her presentation was informative and gave numerous suggestions about how we can be involved as individuals as a group. This meeting was attended by members of the Tuckerton UMC and additional women from our own church. It was a great turnout for this special program.

The UMW annual Sub Sale is scheduled for April 28th. The proceeds will be contributed to the Camden Neighborhood Center, which is one of our on-going mission activities.

On May 1st, the annual Mother/Daughter Dinner will be held in Fellowship Hall at 6:30PM. This year the Men's Group will be providing and serving the dinner. Thank you, men, for stepping up to the challenge. The evening's entertainment will be a talent show which includes ten musical acts, coordinated by Norma Paul and MC'd by Rich Mueller. Who can Donate Blood – It is important that you feel good when you donate blood. Healthy people who are at least 17 years old and weigh 110 pounds or more are usually eligible to donate blood. Federal regulations require that donors wait 56 days between regular whole blood donations.

Please remember to bring proper identification to the blood drive.

Consider being a Power Red Donor (formerly Double Red Cell Donor) if you are type O or B. To be eligible you must be:

Male - at least 130 pounds and 5'1" tall

Female – at least 150 pounds and 5'5" tall

Anyone interested in being a Power Red Donor Call or See Marian Assur for an appointment

Also on the day of the drive there will be the need for support help. Registration, canteen, set up and clean up.
