PASTOR'S CORNER .

As pastor of MUMC, I have been designating each new year's goal for the congregation: for 2014, it was "the year of gratitude". For 2015, it was "the year of knowing Jesus." For 2016, it was "the year of prayer". For 2017, it was "the year of

Jubilee." For **2018**, it will be **the year of the Bible** (reading, to be exact).

I also present an action plan/challenge to every member and friend of MUMC: that is, to **read the entire Bible once this year**. For those who do, I would like to record their names and the date of finish on my book called, "The Book Club." It is a hall of fame for those who indeed have accomplished this feat. Since 2013, 13 people got inducted (see the list at the bottom). I also look forward to recording the names of children who have finished their children's Bible.

MUMC's official membership is 274. So, may I say that about 5 % of the church finished reading the entire Bible? Let me tell you that we can do better than that. Don't get me wrong: I am grateful and proud of our congregation in many aspects. However, I also believe that we can do even better. Hmmm... I wonder if in 2018 we can bring it up to 20 % of the membership, that means **FORTY** more believers in Christ who would take up this challenge and do it? (or, how about 100%? (3))

This challenge may sound insurmountable, but you don't have to despair, because once you know how to read the Bible in a systematic way, you would realize how easy it is. Here's one way to do it: spend each day only 15 minutes. If you spend 15 minutes everyday for a year with the Bible, before you know it, you will finish the entire Bible in a year. I am a living proof of that. Ask any of the 13 inductees, they will testify to that as well. I will also provide another tool to accomplish it. In fact, this one helped many individuals to finish the Bible. It is our 365 Day Bible Reading Planner (pick one up from the Narthex). All you have to do is to start using it. As you go along each day, you mark those chapters you have finished reading that day. Once you are done with reading the entire Bible, you simply let me know the date of finish and which translation you read (for example, KJV, NIV or Living Bible), and you will be inducted (and I would like to buy a lunch for you!)

I cannot overemphasize the importance of getting into God's Word everyday. Why? Because that's where you find God who is the source of love, joy, peace, wisdom and strength. I don't know any serious believer who doesn't take seriously or owe to God's Word for spiritual growth and nourishment.

So, how many lunch engagements should I make this year? Hopefully, more than **FORTY** (3).

MARKED (Thoughts to live by) By Kenneth Schorr

It was perhaps one of the darkest moments in the history of the civilized world. Under the Nazi government, the civil and human rights of those who were Jewish were violated and few if any cared. They were a marked people; forced to wear the Star of David on their clothes, as well as on their homes and business. As time went on others would be marked. Again few would speak out, afraid of the political and financial backlash. Thank God nothing like that could happen here; or could it? Are we approaching the beginning of another dark moment? Read on!

At the time of Jesus' betrayal and arrest, Peter, like the other disciples were marked men; identified as followers of Jesus. When challenged, Peter would deny (Matt. 26: 69-75). When pushed would we (you) take a stand or would we (you) deny Jesus? How strong is your faith?

While on a recent trip, there was a sign in the airport that read, "As of January 2018 you can no longer use you driver's license as identification to board a domestic flight; a new form of identification would be required." Some states have already started making the change. Facial scanning of all citizens is also under development by Homeland Security. In addition, U.S. passports will soon be undergoing a major change. A new format, included in the hologram, a computer chip that will contain all the information about you. All this could be used to make it harder, perhaps even prevent you from traveling as it already does for some right now! What if this scanning or chip included you being a Christian? Marked? Would you speak out in defense of your civil rights and the rights of others as we must or like Peter, would you deny and run? What would happen if you were not allowed to talk about Jesus or live out your faith? If we allow the liberties of travel and speech to be taken away, what next? Marked!

Some may question why should I get involved; it does not apply to me; let someone else do it. Then you have already marked yourself as being another Peter. Where is your faith? Perhaps it is that type of mentality that has helped to create the mess our world, nation, state and community, is already in! I would challenge you to find one verse in Scripture that allows us to disengage from the responsibilities of citizenship; individually, as a church, as a denomination!

Drug Addiction Education Seminar January 14th **during coffee hour** Please plan to join us between services on January 14th for a special talk by Stephen Willis of Hope Sheds Light www.hopeshedslight.org

Stephen L. Willis is the co-founder of HOPE Sheds Light and the Owner/Managing Partner at the Law Offices of Willis & Gresek, PC in Toms River, NJ. Stephen attended Seton Hall University School of Law, Montclair State College and Wittenberg University, and has been published in numerous law journals and magazines in recent years. Stephen is an active member of the New Jersey State Bar Association, the American Bar Association and the Coalition Against Impaired Driving of NJ. Proclamation 5018 -- Year of the Bible, 1983

February 3, 1983

By the President of the United States of America

A Proclamation

Of the many influences that have shaped the United States of America into a distinctive Nation and people, none may be said to be more fundamental and enduring than the Bible.

Deep religious beliefs stemming from the Old and New Testaments of the Bible inspired many of the early settlers of our country, providing them with the strength, character, convictions, and faith necessary to withstand great hardship and danger in this new and rugged land. These shared beliefs helped forge a sense of common purpose among the widely dispersed colonies -- a sense of community which laid the foundation for the spirit of nationhood that was to develop in later decades.

The Bible and its teachings helped form the basis for the Founding Fathers' abiding belief in the inalienable rights of the individual, rights which they found implicit in the Bible's teachings of the inherent worth and dignity of each individual. This same sense of man patterned the convictions of those who framed the English system of law inherited by our own Nation, as well as the ideals set forth in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

For centuries the Bible's emphasis on compassion and love for our neighbor has inspired institutional and governmental expressions of benevolent outreach such as private charity, the establishment of schools and hospitals, and the abolition of slavery.

Many of our greatest national leaders -- among them Presidents Washington, Jackson, Lincoln, and Wilson -- have recognized the influence of the Bible on our country's development. The plainspoken Andrew Jackson referred to the Bible as no less than ``the rock on which our Republic rests.'' Today our beloved America and, indeed, the world, is facing a decade of enormous challenge. As a people we may well be tested as we have seldom, if ever, been tested before. We will need resources of spirit even more than resources of technology, education, and armaments. There could be no more fitting moment than now to reflect with gratitude, humility, and urgency upon the wisdom revealed to us in the writing that Abraham Lincoln called ``the best gift God has ever given to man . . . But for it we could not know right from wrong.'' The Congress of the United States, in recognition of the unique contribution of the Bible in shaping the history and character of this Nation, and so many of its citizens, has by Senate Joint Resolution 165 authorized and requested the President to designate the year 1983 as the ``Year of the Bible.''

Now, Therefore, I, Ronald Reagan, President of the United States of America, in recognition of the contributions and influence of the Bible on our Republic and our people, do hereby proclaim 1983 the Year of the Bible in the United States. I encourage all citizens, each in his or her own way, to reexamine and rediscover its priceless and timeless message. In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this third day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eighty-three, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and seventh.
