Pastor's Corner

2019—the Year of Shalom.

Ahh... another year is upon us. 2019. Every year, on New Year's Eve, at Times Square in NYC, tens of thousands people gather to send off the old year and to welcome the

new year wishing for the best---a year of health and prosperity. Such a gathering happens all over the world—both in the East and the West. I used to attend the New Year's Eve service at midnight with fellow believers in Korea praying for the best year ever. May the Lord grant you all of your wishes this year.

In the past six months, I was searching for the Lord's directions for MUMC in 2019. I was looking for the yearly goal for our church. I strongly felt that the Lord was leading me to the theme of restoration. Psalm 68:9 says, "God **restores** our heritage when it languishes." The verb 'to restore' got my attention and since then it was stuck in my mind for the rest of the year. About that word of restoration, I turned to God's Word to research further. The person replies, "We don't have those kind of problems here." You think dear God another church like Laodicea (Rev.3:14-22)! You get up and leave, never to return. How can you justify or defend ignoring Mt.25:36-41? You cannot!

Sadly the above actually happened and appears to be still happening at all too many area churches. In their comfort zone with little or no major outreach, yet they wonder why people are not coming? The excuses are many. How much longer before the doors slam shut, never to re- open? Instead of being alive and vibrant in Jesus Christ, they are on their deathbed. Blind to their own sin. Family Promise and Chefs on Call





The Candy Cane Story

A candy maker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would be a witness for his Savior, so he made the Christmas Candy Cane. He incorporated several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ. He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy. The white symbolizes the Virgin Birth (Is. 7:14; Luke 1:26-35) and the sinless nature of Jesus (1 John 3:5). The hardness of the candy symbolizes the Solid Rock (1Cor. 10:4), the foundation of the Church (Mt. 16:18), and the firmness of the promises of God (Ps. 18:30-32). The candy maker made the candy into the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to earth as our Savior (1 John 3:16-17), and a symbol to represent the staff of the Good Shepherd (John 10:14). Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candy maker decided to stain it with red stripes, representing the stripes of the scourging Jesus received prior to His crucifixion (Mark 15:15-20) for our healing (Is. 53:5). The large red stripe represents the shedding of His blood on the cross for our salvation (Rom. 5:9; Eph. 1:7). Unfortunately, the Candy Cane has lost its traditional meaning and become just a decoration seen only at Christmas time. But we at Scripture Candy, Inc., pray that this traditional symbol will again be used as a witness for the glory and honor of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Consecration of the Church Roof & Handicap Bathrooms

On Sunday, December 23, 2018 a ribbon cutting ceremony was held at the Manahawkin United Methodist Church to consecrate the new Church and Fellowship Hall roofs and handicap bathrooms.

The ceremony was conducted between the two Sunday services by Pastor Kyewoon Choi and was witnessed by several members of the Trustees and church parishioners. The ceremony included the singing of the first verse of Hymn 545, The Church's One Foundation, followed by a prayer of Dedication of Purpose.

The Dedication of Purpose was then followed by the Trustee Chair, Mr. Rich Mueller, who formally presented the roof and bathrooms to be consecrated for the worship of God and the service of all people.

A three-part prayer to dedicate the consecration of the roof and bathrooms followed with the Pastor, Trustees, and church parishioners all partaking in their respective parts.

Pastor Choi closed the ceremony with a benediction and all recited the Lord's Prayer.

The Trustees then performed the formal ribbon cutting ceremony of the bathrooms.

In addition: The Trustees would like to express their sincere thanks to Bob Molinaro and Bill Welsh for their tireless efforts in ensuring the new bathrooms were completed in accordance with the terms of the contract and conducting several meetings with the contractor's foreman to discuss time and material issues along with several schedule delays.

Most noteworthy was Bill Welsh's efforts in conducting several intensive reviews of the contract language to ensure that all submitted invoices contained completed work costs that reflected the initial contract price agreed to by the Trustees. In addition, he conducted in- depth correspondence with the contractor to resolve several cost expenditure and time and material issues.

As a result of these actions taken by Bob and Bill the new bathrooms were completed within the original budget limitations of the signed contract between Mr. Hembling and the Manahawkin United Methodist Church.

Thanks to both of you for overseeing and protecting the financial investment of these new bathrooms.

It is important that you feel good when you donate blood.

Healthy people who are at least 17 years old and weigh 110 pounds or more are usually eligible to donate blood.

Federal regulations require that donors wait 56 days between regular whole blood donations.

Please remember to bring proper identification to the blood drive.

Consider being a Power Red Donor

(formerly Double Red Cell Donor) if you are type O or B. To be eligible you must be:

Male – at least 130 pounds and 5'1" tall

Female – at least 150 pounds and 5'5" tall

Registration, canteen, set up and clean up.


